July brought both encouraging progress and ongoing challenges across our Malawi programmes, with strong harvests and educational support through Gold Youth, alongside deeply personal stories of care and resilience from the families we support.





Orphan & Vulnerable families Programme

Unite Support Malawi

This quarter, the Orphan and Vulnerable Children programme continued reaching 14 households across Lilongwe rural west. These families and individuals are facing some of the toughest circumstances, from child-headed households to families caring for children with disabilities or serious health conditions.

Every quarter, these households receive food and health support to help them get by. This update is really about the people behind those numbers. Some of the beneficiary updates:



Orphan & Vulnerable families Programme

Triphonia

Triphonia lives with her sister in Mbalame village and is now in Standard 7 at Kakoma Primary School. She was referred to the programme for extra care and support, and today she's doing well in her studies and looking forward to the future. It's exactly the kind of steady progress this programme is built for.

Phalles

Phalles is an elder in Chigothi village, she was recently given two piglets to begin building a small livestock business. This helps the family become more self-sustaining. This is her final quarter receiving support, and the hope is that these piglets multiply into something that carries her family forward long after the programme support ends.



Orphan & Vulnerable families Programme

Doreen

Doreen is 18 and lives with her mum and three siblings in Thyolonjo village, where her mum has been raising the family alone. Doreen has a physical disability and needs care throughout the day. At the moment, she sleeps on a small sack on the floor each night. A proper mattress would mean so much, she'd get better rest and more comfort. It's a small ask that could make a real difference.



Sustainable Family Farms

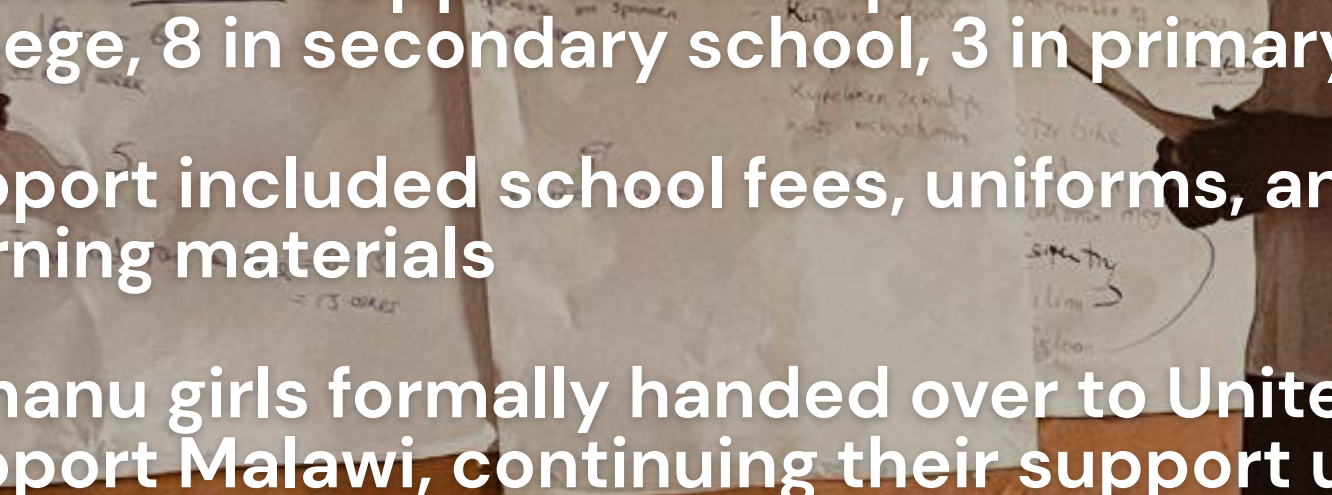
Farming families at M'ngwizi harvested a combined 309 bags of maize this season.

Every single beneficiary repaid their maize loan in full. 120 bags returned in total, real proof that the programme's no-interest loan model is working, which lets families reinvest in the next season without falling into debt.

Early Childhood Development

Across six centres: Kafutwe, Mseteza, Mteza, Chipasula, Mkunkhu, and M'ngwizi, 398 children were enrolled in early learning, with all centres fully stocked with learning materials.

The feeding programme played a big role here too. The children's attendance rose on the days porridge was served, a reminder of how closely nutrition and learning go hand in hand for young children.
